Louise J. Privette is an author who served as the Executive Editor of Inkslingers: Many Worlds Many Stories published in 2021. In the November issue of Writers in the Storm she wrote a blog, Telling a Life: Tips for Composing a Compelling Biography or Memoir.

According to Privette, people read biographies/memoirs to learn more about people they admire or better understand the motivations of those they despise. A great biographer offers a glimpse into the lives of noteworthy individuals. Readers share the individual's journey, experience their triumphs and failures, and gain insights into their own lives.

Speaker

Member Beth Johnson introduced the speaker, Randy Brown, aka Charlie Sherpa, (for following on Facebook). Randy spoke on writing about military experiences and encourages those who served or are serving in the military to write. He encourages first time participants to submit to ISSUED: Stories of Service (more info in events). He has a number of books and anthologies that feature the military voices of veterans and has published works of his own.

Randy distributed a sheet of poetry which he wrote and read to the group. His wit and sensitivity was acknowledged and appreciated by the attendees. He also gave the audience a hand-out entitled, "How to Craft Effective Bio-Burbs" that provided examples of biographical statements





an author should have on hand for self and book promotions. He described his biographical statements "They're like poems" or "personal mission-statements." He recommended that one always start with their first and last name. Then in fifty words or less, give the "5 Ws and an H, with a little personality thrown in." In other words, craft a bio-blurb as a "call to action."
