11:03 – 12:13 PM A panel of three long-time PWC members and successful authors, Mark Walker, Kixx Goldman, and Richard McMaster discussed ins--and-outs of publishing and promotion they have done with their books.

Highlights from panel presentation:

Mark Walker. Wrote/published his 1st book, *Different Latitudes: My Life in the Peace Corps and Beyond*, in 2017. He noted that 3–4 million books are published annually, publishing involves contracts, and publishers are interested in selling services to authors in addition to publishing their books. He disputed the current trend that testimonials are not needed. Toughest thing for author is obtaining reviews. His approach is to review books of fellow authors, which leads to other writing and publishing opportunities. He stressed importance of securing interviews and mentioned Voyage Phoenix (<u>https://voyagephoenix.com/</u>) He tried Kickstart (<u>https://www.kickstartfund.com</u>), which he uses as a publishing mechanism. He also recommended *The Authors Show* <u>https://wnbnetworkwest.com/</u>. He wrote *The Guatemalan Reader* as a way to tell stories and introduce readers to other cultures. Dr. Kixx Goldman. Introduced two puppets she used at her book launch as a way to start communication. Her book *Speak from Your Heart* launched in 2020. She didn't necessarily know the outcome of her book when she started writing. Realized she was writing to herself. *Death of Expertise* by Tom Nichols (2017) influenced her writing. She advised writers to know their strengths and weaknesses and honor their own style. She recommended using a developmental editor, which she found helpful. She provided "Kixx's Manifesto with" 7 DON'Ts about writing and publishing. First was "Don't believe every bit of advice you get about writing." Richard McMaster. Has published 5 novels and admitted that along the way he made all the mistakes, likely due to his impatience and his successful business career. Three ways to publish: traditional (typically only available to famous and celebrity); hybrid (publishers who gain revenue from book sales and fees charged to author to publish) and self-publish. He did better with self-publishing where he called all the shots (editing, covers, design, etc). Stick with AMAZON–they dominate the book market, publishing 80% of books online. Don't skip editing but know what you are paying for. He started with a story editor, then also used copy and developmental editing, and proofreader. Know the difference. Not all editors are good editors. Authors write autobiographically, even in fiction. I write what I know. 


PWC Members Are Busy
